Great! No people! In fact, our group of seven seemed to make up half of the lunch-time customers at the restaurant. As we walked into Yoho Mall, it felt a bit ghostly and very modern. Like Causeway Bay, but without the people. To be fair, Yoho Mall has only been open for less than a year - maybe they are expecting more customers in the coming years. The Mall is pricey for shopping but has a good choice. It's aimed at adults, not kids – full of 'big peoples' toys'. Both Yoho Mall and Stormies get much busier at the weekends.

The restaurant itself is spacious, with a relaxing indoors and outdoors with enormous windows. It was easy to feel very comfortable at the table.



What's Hot

The shared starters were really tasty and made us feel excited when they were placed down. The smoked salmon melted in the mouth and the pork belly burgers were meaty without being too fatty. The chips were especially crispy and came with a variety of lovely dips. The food was beautifully presented and the table didn't feel overcrowded even though we ordered a lot.

The service was very friendly and polite and our waitress was great at re-filling our glasses with water.



What's Not

We only realised we had a lot of fried food when the starters arrived and we should had ordered a salad. The main courses of spaghetti with seafood and fish and chips were fine but we felt they could do better and they were quite heavy after the fried starters.

The shrimp egg noodles are quite unique and this was our favourite dish. The texture of the noodles was al dente and different to noodles in other noodle shops. You can tell that the shop freshly produces the noodles themselves and the noodles have egg in them.

Which restaurant did you like more, Stormies or Ho To Tai?

We liked both and it's hard to compare as they were so different. Both had some quite special food. But the noodle shop was much better value for money. Stormies was expensive and would be too expensive even for a birthday party. Ho To Tai is better to go to with friends. But overall, it depends on your preference and budget.

How about the customers?

The customers were very different. Ho To Tai is more down to earth and it's a traditional noodle shop. The people in Stormies looked richer, while the noodle shop people were more old-fashioned. Ho To Tai is nostalgic, but Yuen Long is changing.

How is Yuen Long changing?

It's becoming gentrified – a sign of this is more rich families moving into the neighbourhood. Now we have the new mall and more people are moving in as new homes are being built. The change in Yuen Long is in its infancy. There's a new mall in Tuen Mun that is much more crowded. Yoho Mall is less crowded, but in the long run Yuen Long will have more and more people.

What do you think of the change?

Yoho Mall is just another shopping mall in Hong Kong. Old shops may close and the development is controversial, especially for the elderly and others who value traditions. Even the wife-cake shop in Yuen Long has become smaller. Yuen Long is a long way from Hong Kong Island, but becoming more like it.

Do you like Yuen Long?

Yes, it's my home. It has traditional food. It's cheap and has some really good small shops that are better than somewhere like Mong Kok. Yuen Long isn't just a concrete jungle, it has lots of diverse and interesting places to explore.




Report on School Excursion to Stanley Hong Kong Island South




Education in

Hong Kong

he education system in Hong Kong is a hot topic and often hits the headlines. Harshly crticised as examorientated, it has been widely debated as flawed. The latest case was the cancellation of the Primary 3 TSA exam in 2016. Many parents felt that young students were overworked and that the system was causing stress. It is not only primary school students that have study pressure, all students in Hong Kong are affected by the focus on intensive learning.

Hong Kong students' talent is hindered by the huge amount of work they are required to do. Children are not only at school for up to 9 or 10 hours a day, but they also have to do daily homework after school. One of the reasons teachers give so much homework in secondary school is DSE preparation. However, a problem with this is that students are not enabled to absorb all of the necessary knowledge.

Having an adverse influence on student health is believed to be an undesirable effect of education in Hong Kong. Physically, students spend lots of time on study which will inevitably lead to less time to sleep. They may easily get sick. Mentally, students may feel stressed because of the heavy workload. With a lack of leisure time and the amount of work, students become burnt out with their health at risk, including suffering from depression, body pains and anxiety.



with these demands? One way is to develop a diversified there are various subjects for students to choose from such as Economics, BAFS, Tourism, Science and History. This does not only increase the diversity of education but also allows students to discover and develop their own interests.

There are steps towards improving all-round development of students in the Hong Kong curriculum which can help decrease pressure. Students should not only be expected to memorise for exams, but be able to apply knowledge. For instance, Liberal Studies emhasises students' critical thinking and analytical skills. Also, apart from traditional classroom learning of subjects, students should have more options to acquire valuable insights through activities such as school trips, drama performances and voluntary services.


In an over-stressed environment, one of the most important things for students to learn is the vital skill of time-management. By following a timetable, students can help to control their time. For example, students can schedule to finish their homework at school, and then they can have more time to do their own thing. Students should communicate with teachers and parents if they are unable to finish their homework to avoid not being able to handle their work and life.

Everything in life should have a balance, otherwise the consequences may be terrible. The teachers can give less homework and focus on the quality of teaching so that students can learn more efficiently. Furthermore, parents shouldn't give too much pressure so that students are able to develop and perform better.



Inside Out

Inside Out is a popular animation film from 2015. The main character is a young girl called Riley and the film is about the emotions in her head as she is growing up. Riley has to handle negative and positive things in her life and it's a meaningful way to think about the emotions we face in our lives.

Riley's mood is controlled by 5 characters who are emotions – Joy, Sadness, Fear, Disgust and Anger. The film starts with Riley moving with her family to San Francisco. Riley experiences all the emotions as she needs to handle change. The character Joy wants Riley to have a happy life, but she doesn't know everyone has mixed feelings and so Riley feels confused.

A lot of the film is about Joy and Sadness, who leave the control centre of Riley's brain. Joy learns the meaning of sadness as she tries to get back to the control centre. School Uniforms

Types of Uniform

Every school or group of schools in Hong Kong has a different uniform. The uniform style in Hong Kong is similar to Britain because Hong Kong was controlled by Britain up to 1997. Since then, Hong Kong has kept the same uniform style.

In China the uniforms are dark colours, such as dark blue, dark grey or dark brown. The surprising attraction of the school uniform in China is the PE uniform which students wear all the time. It is only for very important occasions that students dress up in formal clothes. For primary students, they often wear a red scarf as a

In Japan, the school uniforms look like sailor uniform style. The colour is blue and white, which looks cute and sweet. The skirts are short and often checked. The Korean uniform is similar to Japan, but the skirts are longer. As well as blue and white, the uniforms have some black.

Student Views

School Uniform Advantages

Some students dislike their school uniforms and want to change them or wear their own clothes to school. However, the school uniform has many advantages for students.

Firstly, children do not need to spend extra money on clothes. Many students like to wear fashionable clothes, such as the Korean style right now, but these can be expensive. School uniforms are fairly cheap and as some students come from poor backgrounds, they would be disadvantaged if there were no school uniforms.

School uniforms have the advantage of giving children from the same school an identity which they don't have from their own clothes. A sense of belonging to a school can improve the image of the students and the school. When taking part in a school event, it is more tidy, especially for taking

The sense of identity helps to avoid discrimination. Students may feel rejected if they wear cheap informal dress at school. With school uniforms, there is less chance of bullying and students will not laugh at each other. Though students don't always like their uniforms, the advantages of identity and belonging to a school are strong.





School Uniform Disadvantages

One disadvantage of school uniforms is they are not very practical. For example, the material is too thin to keep students warm in winter. Tung Wah's uniform can keep students warm in spring and autumn, but not on the coldest days of the year. Many girls prefer to wear the skirts and not many choose to wear the trousers. School uniforms are not appropriate for the cold winter weather.

In addition, the summer uniform is white which is difficult to keep clean. Girls do not like to wear the trousers in summer either even though they will get bites from mosquitoes and other kinds of insects.

The design of some school uniforms is quite ugly and students may feel self-conscious about their shape. Also, the style of the uniforms is old-fashioned, for example the patterns. School uniforms can be updated to look modern so that students feel comfortable, the same as wearing their own clothes.

Ideal School Uniform

Our ideal uniform should be gentle and elegant both for females and males. A set of male uniform in winter would include a grey coat, a white turtleneck sweater with black jeans and a dark red scarf. In summer, the male uniform would be a short-sleeved shirt and dark red shorts.

The female uniform would include the same design elements as the male uniform and also be elegant. The winter uniform would have a dark red coat, grey dress, white sweater, a black scarf and black leggings to keep warm. The summer female uniform would include a white short-sleeved shirt and dark red dress.

All students should wear black leather shoes and white socks. The overall look of the ideal school uniform is cool and comfortable.




The school was in a fantastic location in Sai Kung, surrounded by grassy hills with fresh air, which can help us concentrate during lessons.
