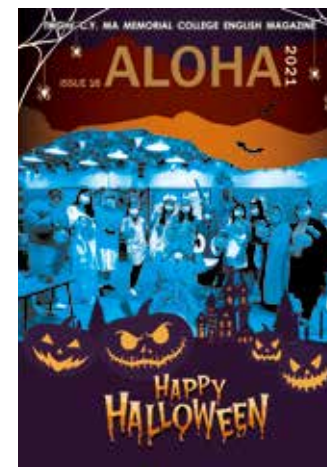

My parents and I, my uncle and other volunteers could watch ourselves on TV at home shortly. What an experience!

After that, the organisation would transport goods to different places where the needy lives in Hong Kong. Moreover, it rented a shop to deliver resources and goods in Central. After going to a variety of places, visiting elderly people living alone and chatting with homeless people on the streets, I feel that I am a lucky girl and I have a great uncle who lives humbly and acts selflessly. People who received our resources were hugely thankful for our help although my uncle and I did not think we did anything big.

Those who were helped smiled like blooming flowers, and so did those that gave a hand. We felt the warmth and love easily. I had a strong feeling that doing good could be a second nature for us. We become good people without awareness. It is a good thing as long as it helps people by all means. Making use of love and communication can overcome many obstacles. Let us light up the torch of love and care and pass it on and on. I will keep running this relay after my uncle. Are you ready to run it after me?

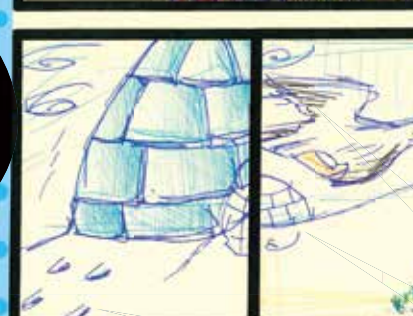

When Hong Kong people think about visiting an Indian restaurant, they might look around for a place in Tsim Sha Tsi in Kowloon, or Wan Chai on Hong Kong Island. Some people in the know may head up to places like Yuen Long town centre, which has a large Indian Subcontinent population. But very few would expect to dine in a quality Indian restaurant deep in the New Territories countryside. However, this is exactly where you will find the Tasty House restaurant.

If you are hiking on Tai Mo Shan or visiting Kadoorie Farm, then you are nearby Tasty House. But even if you're not, Tasty House is well worth the trip for any fan of Indian food. One of the teachers at school suggested a visit to this restaurant for an ALOHA magazine review, so on a Friday afternoon in March, five members of the English Society, along with Mr. Kenny Chan and Mr. Andrew Gray, went along to sample the food.

FOOD

As the starters arrived, Mr. Kenny Chan commented that if Tasty House was in the centre of Yuen Long, it would be crowded with too many customers. The food really was a delight to eat and as the restaurant name suggests, very tasty! The poppadums were very crispy and topped with finely chopped tomatoes, onions and herbs. They went well with the mango lassi (yoghurt) drink, which was very fruity and with no added sugar. Some of the food we were served was unusual and different to other similar restaurants. For example, it is rare to find a finely prepared chopped salad at an Indian restaurant. Some of the food reflected the Pakistani heritage of the restaurant, and the cheese naan bread with brown sugar was unique.



We were able to relax and take our time ordering as lessons had finished for the day.

One day they will be gone.

We should take every opportunity that comes to us and leave no regrets. If there was just one opportunity, we might not know what it is. Just to seize it and never let it slip.

I will remember that song now, just like my grandfather's love still lives in my heart.

Break the Cold Wall

Last week on a rainy day, as I was walking to the MTR station, I saw a homeless man who was wearing tattered clothes and looked like 60 to 70 years of age, walking with a limp. Since the rain was heavy, the ground was very slippery. Then suddenly, the old man lost his balance and tumbled to the ground just as he was crossing the road. The scene reminded me of something.

Last year I saw a news story about an 86-year-old woman who tumbled to the ground when she was trying to cross the road in Liuzhou, one of the cities in Mainland China. What shocked me is that no one went to help her up. She was ignored by every passer-by even though her head was bleeding. I think the lady must have felt desperate at that moment. Tragically, the lady passed away at hospital after the delayed treatment. If I were one of the family members of the granny in this terrible incident, I would be seriously traumatised by the cruelty of society. How can we tolerate such immorality?

I decided to go and check on the unfortunate man I had seen falling down. But I did not believe what I saw when I came closer.

What happened was that a group of people, with no intention of helping him to get up or check if he was injured or not, were taking a video from the side of the road and accusing the poor old man of being fake. In recent years, many news media have reported numerous cases in which a falling elderly person accuses the one trying to help of pushing and hurting them. The scammer then asks for money from the unlucky helper for compensation, or from the insurance company to claim insurance. What a terrible situation when people are mocking a homeless man and not helping him because they think he is a scammer!

The old man, whose face was covered in dust and blood stains, raised his hand to call for help. Just as I was rushing to check on him, a taxi appeared out of nowhere, driving directly towards where the old man had fallen!

People gasped at the thought of what was about to happen! But just in time, the taxi screeched to a halt right in front of the old man. No one was hurt! A young man had rushed out to the old man when he had seen the danger and he now helped him back to the pavement. I thought to myself: finally, someone is here to help this man! A tragedy could have so easily happened.

The old man held the young man's hand. "Thank you, sir. You saved my life... God bless you," he said in a trembling voice. "It was nothing," said the young man with a smile. A passer-by called the medical service. An ambulance arrived swiftly, and the medical staff went to check on the old man. They then moved the old man into the ambulance and drove him to the hospital for treatment.

It was an unforgettable experience. I could not believe that there are people in this society who are so cold. Some of us take advantage of other people's kindness, which makes people afraid of helping others. I am glad to see that society is not so cold after all. There are good people around us. Also, I admire the young man for his bravery as he was thinking only of the old man's safety. He did not ask for anything in return.

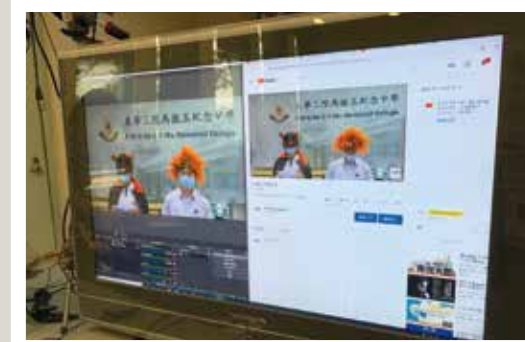
LAC Day Language Across the Curriculum Day

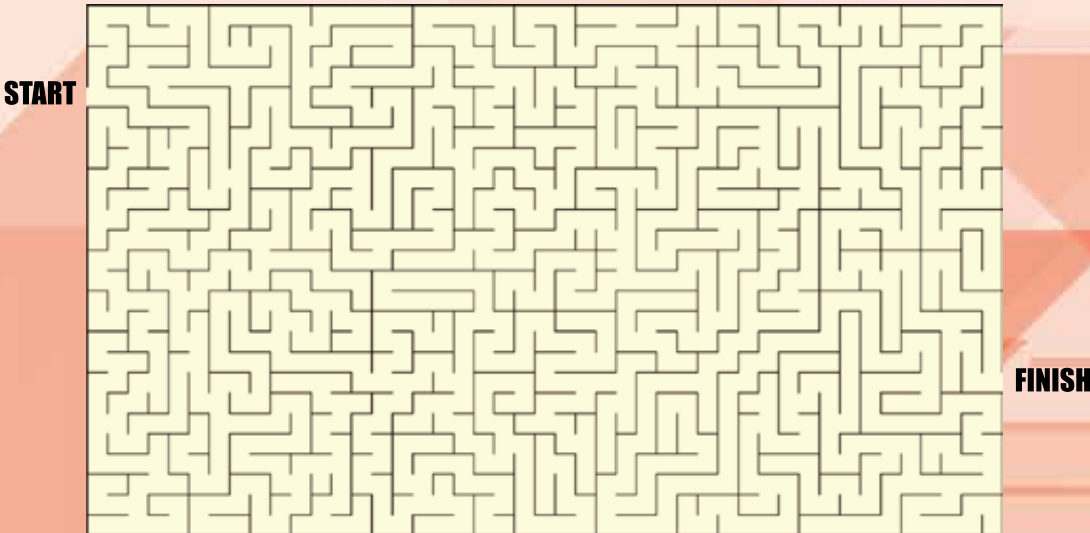
